philanthropy

Women & Philanthropy's collective voice is formed by each investor who makes a minimum annual contribution of \$1,000 to a pooled fund. Every year, members vote on how the fund will be allocated among ASU programs, initiatives and scholarships.

a legacy of impact at ASU

Over the past 11 years, Women & Philanthropy has awarded more than \$2.57 million to 71 ASU programs, supporting some of the university's most innovative endeavors.

Women & Philanthropy members have made a tremendous impact across ASU's four campuses. Through Women & Philanthropy grants, ASU faculty and students are tackling society's greatest challenges and making a difference locally and globally.

The ASU areas of impact that have benefited from Women & Philanthropy grants are:





education innovation \$1,297,514

In 2013–14, a \$100,000 grant supported the Pave Program in Arts Entrepreneurship, which infuses entrepreneurship throughout arts education. The Pave Program teaches emerging artists that through creative engagement with communities and audiences, they can sustain careers in the arts that are meaningful and impactful.





In 2013–14, a \$75,257 grant helped position ASU as the global epicenter of transforming DNA design ideas into solutions for problems that impact everyday life. Synthetic Biology ASU is a collection of DNA building blocks for synthetic genes and community-sourced information that will be distributed to scientists and students on demand.

our scholarship: a legacy of hope

Another way Women & Philanthropy is making a lasting impact at ASU is through its **New American University Scholarship Endowment Fund.** In honor of its 10th anniversary, members contributed more than \$102,500, which receives matching funds from ASU. The endowment will provide scholarship funds in perpetuity for deserving students with financial need.





health care initiatives \$240,000

In 2006–07, a \$50,000 grant to ASU's College of Nursing and Health Innovation allowed it to purchase a full-scale infant simulator with realistic anatomy and clinical functionality. Nursing students are able to increase their skills by practicing on a lifelike infant.





community outreach \$520,839

In 2013–14, a \$61,781 grant greatly enhanced journalism students' newsgathering operations in places that are often under-represented by the media. Funds purchased the Dejero video transmitter, cutting-edge technology that enables students to report from remote locations, shedding light on stories that often remain in the dark.





ASU student scholarships **\$250,166**

In 2012–13, a \$17,766 grant provided funds for advanced journalism students from around the country to work under the guidance of leading journalists on a major investigative reporting project. The project focused on returning veterans, particularly female veterans and their families, drawing attention to an under-reported subject.
